In 2008-2009, at Q3 there had been 28 house sales in the year to date by clients and £342,450 was recovered by the authority for fees paid. At Q3 in 2009-2010, there have been 84 house sales raising a total of £1,581,568 in income for long-term care funding owed. This is a huge increase and is indicative that either more people are selling their houses or that more people are purchasing houses in the current climate, but also that the Authority has increased income on long-term care funding from house sales.
