### 1. Executive Summary

### 1.1 Introduction

This report provides a summary of the performance of the People Services Department during Quarter Three of 2018/19. The report outlines the Department's performance against the priorities of Bolton's Community Strategy – Bolton Vision 2030. The Department has refreshed its performance management framework to refocus its reporting around the three 'life stages' which are central to the delivery of the department's priorities; Starting Well, Living Well and Ageing Well. The following section highlights key performance headlines from the three performance dashboards which are available at section 1.5.

### 1.2 Starting Well

The Starting Well dashboard includes performance indicators across early years, children's social care, education learning and child public health services. Key issues highlighted in this quarter's performance include:

- Strong Early Years performance for children with SEND for the first time, Children with SEND have achieved a Good Level of Development at Early Years Foundation Stage.
- **Improving performance at KS4** Bolton is one of 3 Local Authorities in North West with improvement in Progress 8 in 2018. Bolton now ranks 8<sup>th</sup> out of 23 North West Local Authorities.
- Numbers of Children requiring a safeguarding intervention are fluctuating from month to month but the overall trend is for a lower level of referrals. However, levels of Children and Young people classed as Children in Need or needing a higher-level safeguarding intervention are more stable.
- Looked After Children Bolton's rate of Looked After Children remains at a higher level than previously, with the Quarter 3 rate back up to 93 per 10,000.

### 1.3 Living Well

The Living Well dashboard includes performance indicators reflecting services within adult social care, safeguarding adults and population health.

- Improvements in the rate of adults with learning disabilities in paid employment The rate of adults with learning disabilities in paid employment at Quarter Three is at its highest rate with 25 individuals (3.4%) now in paid employment, exceeding the target of 3.1%. The role of Bolton Employment Support Team (BEST) in central to this increase and has arranged 4 new work placements arranged during Quarter 3. Despite this improvement, Bolton continues to perform below comparators and the national average and is ranked 131 in the country as at the end of 2017/18.
- Levels of demand on 'front door' adult social cares services The level of requests for new support remains at a similar level to the end of last year, however the rate of new clients progressing to an assessed service has reduced slightly this quarter.
- **Safeguarding adults outcomes** Performance on safeguarding adults concerns and enquiries shows that Bolton is very close to national and regional averages in terms of rates of concerns raised, however continues to have a lower rate of Section 42 enquiries. Bolton also compares well in terms of the rates of risk removed or reduced at the end of a safeguarding investigation.

### 1.4 Ageing Well

The ageing well dashboard focuses on services for older people, specifically on factors that affect their overall health and services that support their independence.

- Permanent admissions of older people to residential and nursing care Despite still having one of the highest rates of permanent admissions of older people to residential and nursing care in the region, supporting data on levels of service provision across the system show that Bolton is supporting older people's independence and keeping them out of residential settings for as long as possible.
- **CQC quality ratings** 82% of CQC-registered homes in Bolton are rated Good or better by CQC in Q3, which is an improvement on last quarter's figure if 80%. Further detailed analysis of CQC data by NW ADASS shows that 72.1% of Care Home Beds in Bolton are in homes rated Good or better, placing Bolton above the Greater Manchester average.

### Quarter 3 2018/2019


Pupil attainment for the 2017-18 academic year is positive. Bolton is one of 3 Local Authorities in North West with improvement in Progress 8 in 2018, meaning that Bolton is now 8th out of 23 North West Local Authorities. KS2 attainment is similarly positive, while performance of Bolton's schools at Ofsted inspection compares favourably to national averages.

**Performance Headlines** 

Performance at EYFS is improving, and Bolton is closing the gap on national, regional and statistical neighbour comparators. This positive overall picture should not distract attention from some positive achievements for some individual groups of pupils for individual groups of pupils within the wider cohort. It is particularly noteworthy that for the first time, Bolton children with SEND achieved a Good Level of Development at EYFS. The volatility in numbers of EHCP completed within timescales occurs within the context of a significant increase in the numbers of plans completed. The number of children with an EHCP in Bolton has increased by 80% since 2010 - this rate of increase is almost twice the national average.

Trend in safeguarding is for a lower level of referrals, but the numbers of children and young people classed as CiN or need a higher level safeguarding intervention are not declining at the same rate.

Numbers of adoptions in Bolton are lower than they have been in the past. This is a reflection of wider national trends and Bolton continues to perform well in comparison to regional and national comparators.



#### 2. External judgements of Bolton services and provision

#### 2.1 Ofsted Judgements on Bolton Settings for Children




Bolton is ranked 86th in the country at the end of Quarter 3 with 89.4% of primary schools judged to be good or outstanding. On this measure Bolton is now slightly above the England average of 89.3%. On the measure of the proportion of pupils attending a good or outstanding school. with Bolton ranked 67th in the country and remains above the England average; 90.7% of Bolton primary pupils attend a good or outstanding school compared to 88.9% nationally. Bolton's secondary schools now rank 90th in the country with 77.8% of secondary schools, educating 81.4% of secondary pupils in Bolton, judged to be good or outstanding.

Consultation on the inspection framework for schools which will come into operation from September 2019 have been launched. Ofsted propose that schools will be judged against the following areas:

- Quality of Education
- Personal Development
- Behaviour and Attitudes
- Schools' Leadership and Management

### 2.2 CQC inspections of care providers in Bolton



At the end of Q3, 94% of Bolton CQC registered community based adult social care services were judged to be good or outstanding, with 82% of Bolton CQC registered homes being judged to be good or outstanding. In relation to this 72.1% of CQC registered beds were judged to be good or outstanding.

### 2.3 Local Authority / Local Area Inspections

The Department recently participated in the annual Peer Challenge process co-ordinated by the Association of Directors of Children's Services (ADCS). This exercise validated the Department's view of its own performance, which is derived from internal monitoring and performance data, and noted pressure on school places as a key issue for Bolton in coming years.

Ofsted's programme of inspections of Local Authority Children's Services (ILACS) has continued, 31 reports have been published since the start of the new framework with 20 of those being graded as "Outstanding" or "Good" overall. Ofsted's SEND inspections have continued throughout the quarter.

To date, 3 inspection reports have been published against the JTAI inspection 'deep dive' theme on the multi-agency response to child sexual abuse in the family environment. Ofsted have recently announced the next 3 'deep dive' themes;

- children living with mental health issues;
- prevention and early intervention;
- older children in need of help and protection, and contextual safeguarding, including exploitation.

The JTAI on children living with mental health issues will begin in summer 2019, with the guidance for this published in June.

There has been no new activity on CQC Local System Reviews since the report 'Beyond barriers: how older people move between health and care in England' report was published in July last year, which summarised findings from the first 20 local area reviews.

North West neighbours are the comparator group for adult social care, based on the approach set out by NW ADASS.

DfE and Ofsted advocate the idea that authorities should compare their performance to that of similar areas on the basis that comparing to similar local authorities should provide a reasonable method of context adjustment. Groups of similar local authorities are referred to as "Statistical Neighbours". Different ways of identifying similar local authorities has led to different statistical neighbour sets being developed.
