1. Executive Summary

1.1 Introduction

This report provides a summary of the performance of the People Services Department during Quarter One of 2019-20. The report outlines the Department's performance against the priorities of Bolton's Community Strategy – Bolton Vision 2030. The Department has refreshed its performance management framework to refocus its reporting around the three 'life stages' which are central to the delivery of the department's priorities; Start Well, Live Well and Age Well. The following section highlights key performance headlines from the three performance dashboards which are available at section 1.5.

1.2 Starting Well

The Starting Well dashboard includes performance indicators across early years, children's social care, education learning and child public health services. Key issues highlighted in this quarter's performance include:

- The most notable new national data this quarter relates to children with SEND. This covers the period to the end of the 2018 calendar year. During 2018 there was an improvement in the rate of plans issued on time, and Bolton is in third quartile on the national data for this time period. National data suggests that Bolton now has a slightly higher proportion of its children with an EHCP than the national average but a lower proportion of children with SEND support.
- Quarter 1 has shown a decrease in the rate of Looked After Children (LAC) when compared to Quarter 4 last year, however the current rate is still higher than the previous quarter (Quarter 3). There has been an increase in the number of LAC adoption and Bolton's rate is above previous year's data and latest available comparator data.
- Local data for Quarter 1 has seen a further increase in the number of LAC with 3 or more placements during the year, in line with the last few years in Bolton. This is still below the latest available comparator data.
- The proportion of children benefitting from funded early education fell slightly this was also the case
 nationally. Bolton remains in the third quartile but near to the boundary of the second quartile. A task
 group has been set up to drive take-up of two-year-old funding working on a 'theme' basis each
 meeting to look at processes and linkages with services that work with families e.g. health visitors and
 ACIS. Processes are in place to use a nationally provided list to target known families.
- Local monthly referral rates have continued vary with data at the end of Quarter 1 seeing a decrease from the previous quarter. The rate is now lower than the published data for 2017/18 but above the latest published national and North West data. The percentage of re-referrals within 12 months of the previous referral remains stable compared to previous quarterly data.
- A marked decrease in those subject to a Child Protection Plan has been seen in the local data for this quarter, which is now lower than the published data for 2017/18 and is also below the latest available comparator data.

1.3 Living Well

The Living Well dashboard includes performance indicators reflecting services within adult social care, safeguarding adults and population health. Key issues highlighted in this quarter's performance include:

• The Bolton Public Health Team have developed a report on the recent trends in both life expectancy and healthy life expectancy in Bolton, and how the opportunities in Bolton's Vision can be used to narrow inequalities and improve health. Our "Health in All Policies" approach has been presented to each directorate, corporate leadership team and discussed with our CCG colleagues. The next steps

will involve identifying priority areas to begin the implementation of Health in All Policies, including how we will measure the impact.

- Performance of adults with learning disabilities in paid employment has improved further in Quarter 1 with 27 individuals now in paid employment. The Greater Manchester Learning Disability Strategy 100 Day Challenge, launching in October, will further support this work with a Taskforce focusing on paid employment for people with learning disabilities.
- The level of requests for new support from Adult Social Care and the rate of new clients progressing to an assessed service have both reduced this quarter, continuing a consistent trend over the last year, which points to the effectiveness of preventative support in the community.
- The numbers of safeguarding adults concerns and enquiries went up steadily throughout last year. There was a further slight increase in the number of concerns in Quarter 1 with Bolton's performance now close to the regional average. Bolton's rate of Section 42 enquiries has been lower than our comparators for some time, but with another increase in Quarter 1 following a gradual rise in enquiries during last year is bringing local performance nearer to the regional average.

1.4 Ageing Well

The ageing well dashboard focuses on services for older people, specifically on factors that affect their overall health and services that support their independence. Key issues highlighted in this quarter's performance include:

- Recent improvements in data quality have enabled more accurate and robust measurement and monitoring of the average number of hours of home care commissioned. As a result, the number of home care hours commissioned are higher, as they show the additional hours where doubling up on staff is needed for some support, for example lifting them out of bed.
- In another refinement, the calculation of the rate of service users receiving home care has changed. This is due to the definition being broadened to include wider community support. The result is that figures are higher, which is positive as it evidences that a greater number of people are being supported in the community, as opposed to having to enter institutional care. Adjustments to comparator figures are expected as other areas, particularly in Greater Manchester, review their approach.
- CQC ratings of Bolton community based social care services continue to show strong performance, with 92.1% rated good or better, down slightly from 94.7% reported in Quarter 4, but still well above the target of 85%. The proportion of Bolton care homes rated Good or better remains just below 80% but has improved slightly.

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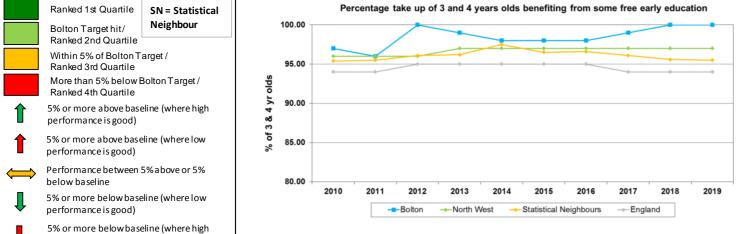

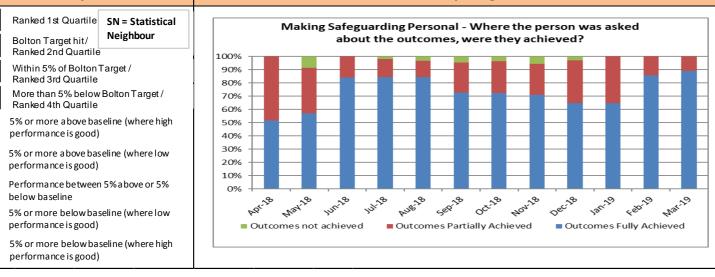

In the last two months of the year there were only a small proportion of cases where the individual's outcomes were not achieved, with outcomes fully achieved for 90% of people in March.

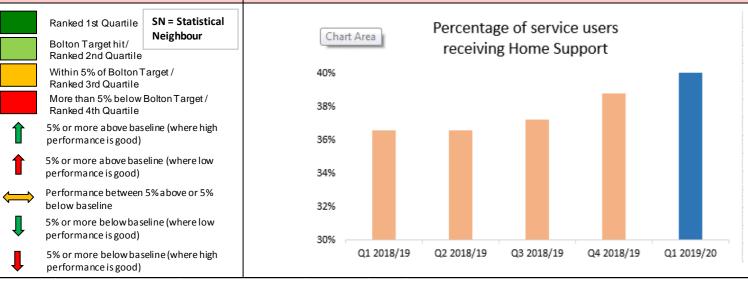
There have been changes to the methodology in calculating the average number of hours of home care commissioned and to the proportion of service users receiving home care. Both measures were showing Bolton's performance as being slightly below the North West averages. The figures are now higher but are more meaningful, and adjustments to comparator figures are expected as other areas, particularly in Greater Manchester, review their approach. Improvements in data quality mean that the number of home care hours commissioned now includes the additional hours where two staff are required to provide support. The proportion of service users receiving home care has risen due to the definition being broadened to include wider community support. See Data Spotlight below.

3. External judgements of Bolton services and provision

3.1 Ofsted Judgements on Bolton Settings for Children

Bolton is ranked 78th in the country at the end of Quarter 1 with 88.5% of primary schools judged to be good or outstanding. On this measure Bolton remains above the England average of 87.1%. On the measure for the proportion of pupils attending a good or outstanding school, Bolton is ranked 60th in the country and remains above the England average. 89.8% of Bolton primary pupils attend a good or outstanding school compared to 86.8% nationally. Bolton's secondary schools now rank 105th in the country with 68.4% of secondary schools judged to be good or outstanding, with 70.1% of secondary pupils in Bolton attending a good or outstanding school.



Oustanding Good RI Inadequate

The detail of the new inspection framework for schools which will come into operation from September 2019 has been confirmed. Ofsted has confirmed that schools will be judged against the following areas:

- Quality of Education
- Personal Development
- Behaviour and Attitudes
- Schools' Leadership and Management

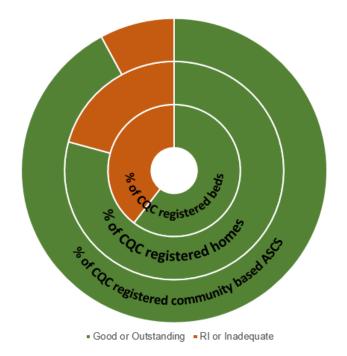
Ofsted has given an undertaking that the introduction of the new framework will not see a raising of the bar that schools are required to pass to secure a "Good" rating.

The Department's Connexions service has received an external review through the Matrix assessment scheme. This was positive, with excellent feedback on the quality of the service provided.

3.2 CQC inspections of care providers in Bolton

At the end of Quarter 1, 92.1% of Bolton CQC registered community-based adult social care services were judged to be good or outstanding, maintaining strong performance.

79.25% of Bolton CQC registered homes are judged to be good or outstanding, this is a slight increase on previous performance on this measure. Although the number of registered homes rating as 'requires improvement' has not changed, the increase in performance is due to a new inspection of a registered home being rated as 'good'. CQC data enables the translation of the ratings of homes into number of beds (places) for people supported in care homes across the Borough. 60.4% of registered beds are in homes judged to be good or outstanding, this is the same as the previous month. The two nursing homes recently rated in the previous quarter as 'requires improvement' are both very large homes, with a total of 300 beds between them.



Further detail on judgements of care provision in Bolton is available at Appendix A.

3.3 Local Authority / Local Area Inspections

Ofsted's programme of inspections of Local Authority Children's Services (ILACS) has continued, 58 reports have been published since the start of the new framework with 58 of those being graded as "Outstanding" or "Good" overall. Focussed visits have continued across various themes, with the majority being against the themes of; Contact, Referral and Assessment, Children in Need/Children on Child Protection Plans and the Front Door.

Ofsted's SEND inspections and re-visits have continued throughout the quarter. To date 93 authorities have been inspected against the SEND framework.

The JTAI framework guidance was updated in May, the main change being the removal of the details about inspection timelines, these details are set out in the specific deep dive theme guidance. The JTAI inspection 'deep dive' theme guidance on Child Exploitation has also been updated to cover both sexual and criminal exploitation. The previous guidance referred specifically to sexual abuse.

The JTAI inspection 'deep dive' theme guidance on children and young people living with mental ill health has been released. The publication confirms that this guidance will be used from September 2019 to evaluate children and young people's experiences of living with mental ill health with a focus on those aged 10 to 15 years old.

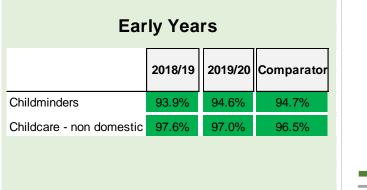

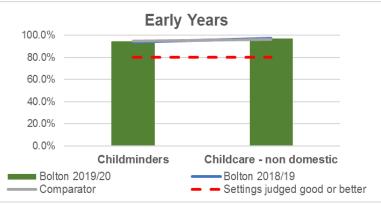

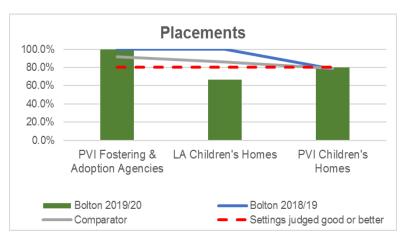
