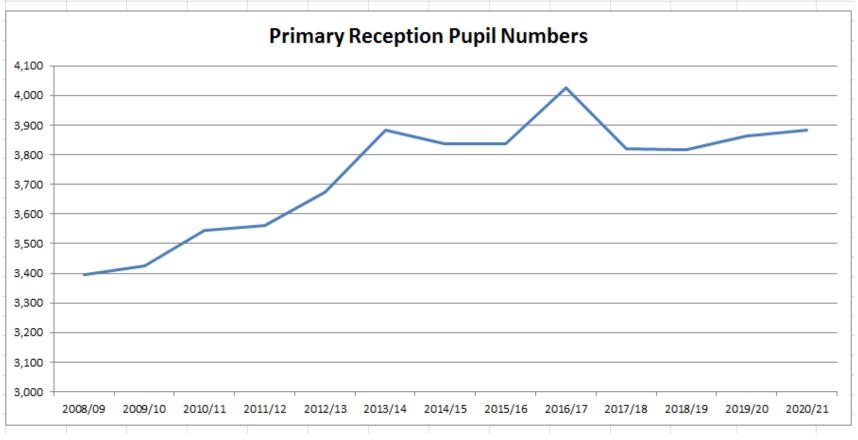

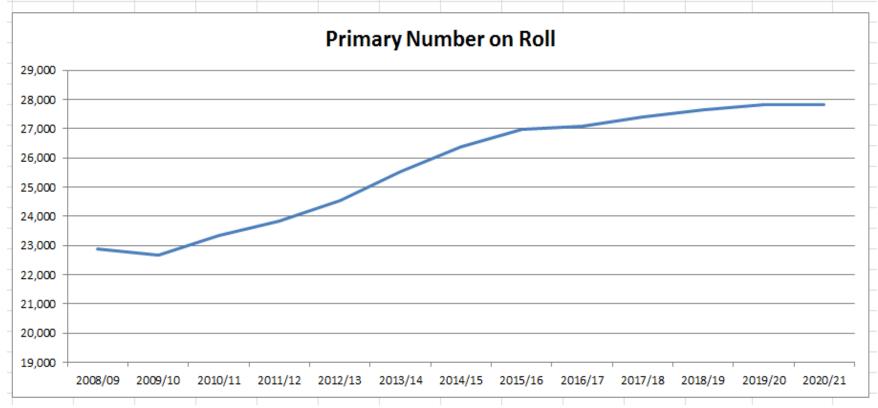
Growth in Primary School Pupil Numbers 2008 - 2020

Growth in Primary School Pupil Numbers 2008 - 2020

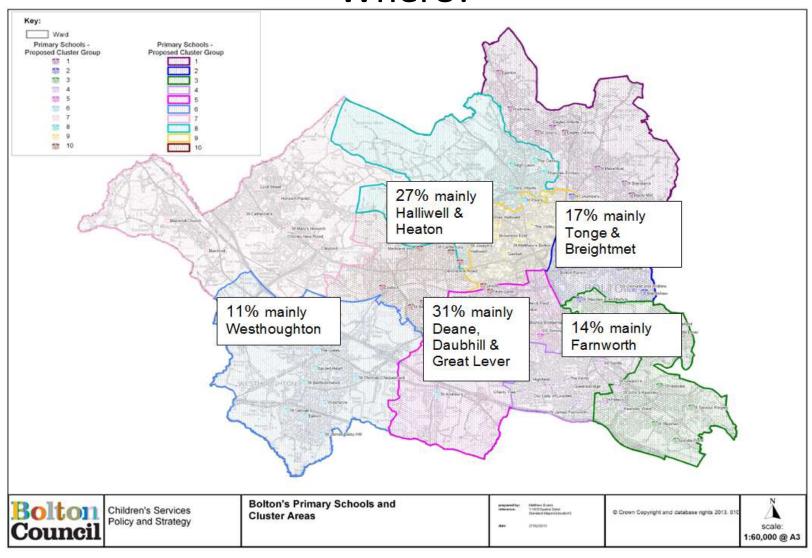
 By Sept 2016 Primary Reception Intakes will have increased by over 600 pupils since Sept 2008 (an increase of almost 15%)

 By Sept 2020 the overall number of primary school pupils will have increased by 5,000 (an increase of 22%)

The Primary School Expansion Programme

- In September 2010, Bolton began a programme to expand primary schools across the Borough
- Over 500 new reception places created
- Over 3,500 new primary school places created
- New places provided at 34 different primary schools
- At LA Community Schools, LA Voluntary Controlled Schools, LA Voluntary Aided Schools, Academies, and Free Schools

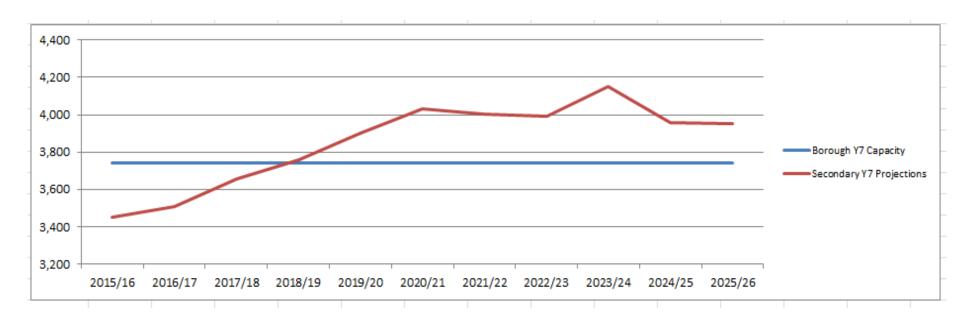

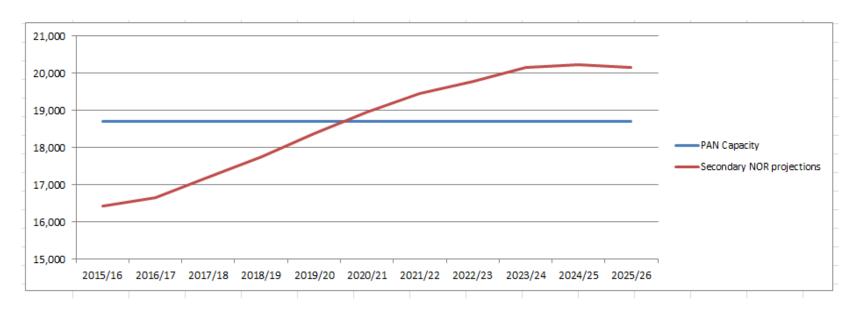

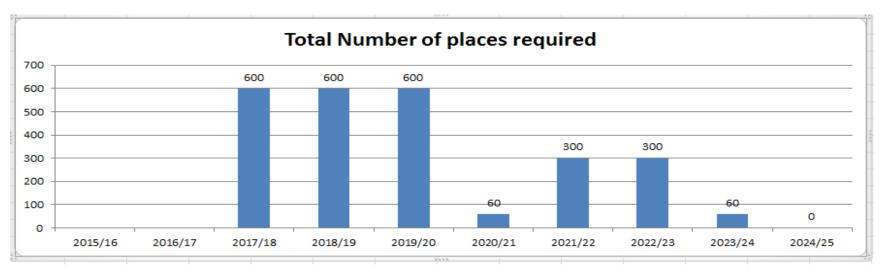

Secondary School Pupil Projections

- Geographical Variations
 - North area Y7 capacity likely to be exceeded by Sept 2018 and overall capacity exceeded by Sept 2020
 - South area Y7 capacity likely to be exceeded by Sept 2017 and overall capacity exceeded by Sept 2020
 - West area Y7 capacity likely to be exceeded by Sept 2017 and overall capacity exceeded by Sept 2019
- Identifying the above variations will better inform priorities and proposals

Bolton Pupil Projections Other Issues

- £13.3M Basic Need Funding for 2018/19 recently announced;
- Special School Pressures (both Primary and Secondary);
- Changing school landscape and Academisation the LA less likely to be a provider of school places;
- Increasing pressure for in-year admissions;
- Pressures from new house building such as Horwich Loco Works and the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework;
- The above data is based upon current birth rates, which could change
