Summary:

This report outlines the financial position in respect of Environmental Services portfolio for the 2011/12 financial year, as at the end of Quarter Three.

Key Issues:

Revenue Expenditure:

Revenue expenditure is projected to underspend against the budget by £82,000.

The department has budgeted to use reserves of £143,000.

There are no major variances to report.

Capital Expenditure:

Capital expenditure for the quarter totals £6.787m against a programme of £20.714m.

Reserves:

The Department's projected deficit reserve position at 31st March 2012 is £1,226,000.

Detailed repayment plans are included within the report.

Efficiency targets:

Budgeted efficiency savings for the department are £3,705,000 which includes demand led of £200,000 to repay the deficit reserve.

The current projection is to achieve 100% of the planned efficiencies.

Risk:

Specific areas of financial risk relate to loss of income due to the economic downturn, energy prices for street lighting and winter services.

VARIANCE ANALYSIS

The overall financial position for the department amounts to a projected final outturn position of an underspend of £82,000 of the net budget.

2.3.1 STANDARD SPENDING ACCOUNTS

The projected outturn position for the Standard Spending Accounts amounts to £25,000 less than the revenue budget.

At this point in the year there are no major variances to report.

2.3.2 TRADING ACCOUNTS

The projected outturn position in relation to the trading accounts is an underspend of £57,000.

At this point in the year there are no major variances to report.

2.4 STRATEGIC GROWTH & REDIRECTIONS

In setting the Strategic Budget for the year, the Department was required to implement £3,705,000 of redirections. With the transfer of Albert Halls to the department during the year the revised total became £3,794,000. The £3,794,000 includes demand led of £200,000 to repay the deficit reserve. The details are shown at Appendix A to the report.

Redirections

Adjustments have been made to budgets to reflect the redirections approved as part of the budget.

Action has been taken to implement the redirections, and ongoing monitoring of expenditure against the options has been incorporated in producing the financial monitoring information outlined at Section 2 of this report.

Appendix A details the approved options and the projected year end position. At this point in the financial year we are forecasting that 100% of the efficiencies will be met.

3 CAPITAL PROGRAMME MONITORING

Appendices Bi and Bii outline the capital outturn position for the Department for 2011/12 at quarter 2.

3.1.1 Highways Programmes

The available budget of £14.482 million is made up of:

• £5.888 million of new approvals for 2011/12 Page 6 of 18

- £6.557 million of slippage from 2010/11
 - principally the Transport Infrastructure Fund
- £2.037 million of in year approvals.

The information shows highways capital expenditure of £5,273k (Appendix Bi) against an available allocation of £14.482 million.

3.1.2 Other Departmental Programmes

The available budget of £6,232 million is made up of £2.473 of new approvals for 2011/12, £3.184 million of slippage from 2010/11 and £575k of additional items approved in year. In respect of the non highways capital expenditure (Appendix Bii), expenditure of £1,677k has been incurred against a programme of £6.232 million.

Proposals to Repay Deficit Reserves

The projected deficit reserve position (general reserve) totals £1,226,000.

The Table below outlines the proposal, showing that deficits would be repaid by the end of the 2013/14 financial year.

5 RISK AREAS

The Department faces the challenge of managing a balanced budget in the current economic climate, with increased fuel, energy costs, waste minimization and the impact on the levy account and potential pressures if there is a severe winter.

Areas of future financial risk that have not been reported elsewhere within this report are as follows:

5.1 Loss of income due to the economic downturn

This will impact on the delivery of all the strategic priorities if not achieved. This is being felt across the Department, particularly impacting on:

- Highways Developers' income
- Road works, skips, scaffold licenses
- Trade waste income
- Reduction in external income as a result of the current financial climate
- Section 106

One of the main risks will be ensuring improvements in satisfaction whilst managing expectations in the current economic climate coupled with the efficiency agenda.

5.2 Increases in Energy Costs

Environmental Services has a potential risk if energy prices go up more than anticipated during the financial year. This will particularly affect Street Lighting.

There is currently an issue regarding the costs relating to the distribution of energy. It is anticipated that any overspend relating to this specific issue will be picked up corporately as part of the year end closure processage 8 of 18

5.3 Severe Winter

Environmental Services has received corporate support over previous years due to the impact of severe weather. Within this report it is assumed that any overspend relating to this specific issue will be picked up corporately as part of the year end closure process.

5.4 Increases in Fuel prices

The actual fuel inflation is anticipated to be higher than originally budgeted. For Environmental Services, fuel costs are a major budget item. The department will be monitoring this area closely throughout the year.

5.5 Waste Minimisation and Recycling Initiatives

There is currently concern around the potential increase in the waste levy payment. In order to mitigate the potential increases the department is working on a waste minimisation and recycling initiative. In the short term there may be additional collection costs incurred that would enable future savings on the levy account.

Food within the garden waste was implemented from the 3rd October. Potentially there maybe an additional waste collection cost of providing this service in the region of £163k for 2011/12. It was intended that the additional collection cost could be mitigated by the introduction of other recycling initiatives that have not had political approval at this point.

There is a risk that the disposal costs associated with school waste is not covered by existing budgets. This is an issue that has been discussed with the corporate centre and will be considered as part of the year end closure process.

6 PERFORMANCE

6.1 DEPARTMENTAL CONTEXT

Due to changes to the performance framework last year, the department is currently in a transition period awaiting the publication of the new Sustainable Community Strategy. The Performance Dashboard for the next year will focus on key priorities and planned activities for 2011/12 and any key performance findings will be shown on the front page and change according to seasonal or departmental activities. Measurable targets are currently being developed and will be included in this performance report once approved.

6.2 KEY PERFORMANCE THIS QUARTER

6.2.1 Waste and Recycling

Waste diverted from landfill.

Last year's actual percentage or waste diverted from landfill was 28% (2010/11) The household waste per household for Quarter 3 is 138.33kg, compared with 150.11kg in Quarter 1 and 148.39kg for Quarter 2.

6.2.2 Cleanliness of the Borough

Previously cleanliness was measured using the national performance indicator (NI 195 – Cleanliness DLEQs) which was specifically designed to measure the levels of litter, detritus, graffiti and flyposting within a Borough. This indicator was deleted along with the National indicator set in October 2010. A simpler survey has now been developed which measures litter, detritus, weed growth, shrub maintenance, grass cutting and an overall grade based on the old methodology in NI195. LEQ's (Local Environmental Quality surveys) are carried out and planned in a similar way using areas and land uses. Three surveys are planned per year to cover the borough. These are the results of survey one and two:

6.2.3 Highways and Engineering

The number of children killed or seriously injured (KSI) and slight casualty has decreased considerably from last year's figures, cumulative figures up to quarter 3 are shown below.

The number of KSI has fallen from 71 to 60 and child KS has decreased from 18 to 8 with slight casualties also falling from 514 to 478.

6.2.4 Awards

i) Bolton Market was successful in winning "The Best Food Market" in BBC Radio 4 Food Farming Awards

The Judges commented on how it filled them with hope when they visited Bolton Market, how wonderful it was to see produce displayed in such a way, amazed by the diversity of produce on sale, Pigs cheeks, tripe and offal sitting alongside Razor Clams, Oysters and Indonesian Milk Fish. Pot Herbs being made in the same traditional way, whilst on the stalls opposite products such as Okra, Curry leaves and a selection of chillies rarely found outside of London were being sold.

- ii) The Department received 10 nominations at the Bolton's Best Awards held this quarter picking up two awards one for "Best Manager Award" and one for "Best Customer Care Award"
- iii) The school meals service reached the regional finals of school cook of the year award and trained 4 staff to NVQ level 3 in Hospitality Supervision.

Also we picked up an award for Local Authority Caterer of The Year – Educating Award based on innovation of the promotion and sustained uptake levels.

In partnership with the School food trust four managers gained the "Train the trainer award".

6.3 SERVICE IMPROVEMENTS AND UPDATES

6.3.1 Street Lighting Carbon Reduction Project

1,619 street lighting installations have been fitted with equipment. This is an increase of 488 from Quarter 2 and is now having lighting profiled at night which is contributing to the carbon reduction programme. The next phase will see 150 watt lamps targeted giving greater carbon reductions as smaller wattages were done in the early phase.

6.3.2 Bolton Market - Electronic Loyalty Faged 11 of 18

Bolton Market introduced the first Electronic Market loyalty Card in November 2011.

Over 600 cards have been issued with an 85% registration rate, showing 25% repeated weekly usage. This scheme will allow us to track buying habits to enable us to shape the market for the future, customer profile and product mix.

The next steps are to target university students with the loyalty card to drive new footfall and raise awareness and use direct marketing to customers, seasonal product arrivals, and special offers.

Also carry out loyalty card electronic surveys

6.3.3 Bolton Market - Wellbeing Project

October 2011 saw the start of the Bolton Market 'Wellbeing Project'. This is a joint venture between Bolton Council and the NHS. Volunteers attend once a week for 10 weeks and learn to:

- Shop on a market
- Understand produce that doesn't have sell by dates or come with instructions
- Cook a tasty healthy meal from start to finish
- Save money
- · Reduce food waste.

6.3.4 Schools Meals service

Out of 81 schools inspected 77% kitchens received the top 5 star rating (very good) for hygiene and a further 23% received a 4 star (good).

The service also achieved the highest primary school meal uptake in the UK at 67% of school roll (autumn 2011/winter 2012) with the lowest tariff or price of a meal across the UK – at £1.25.

Also conducting a waste cooking oil project where the product is converted to a biofuel to run a Council vehicle.

7.0 INTERNAL BUSINESS PERFORMANCE

7.1 Sickness Absence

This quarter's sickness absence performance is running at 5.8 %. The cumulative totals at the end of December are 4.5%. This is well under the departmental target of 6.25% and takes into account winter months.

7.2 Complaints

The department received 170 complaints, of which 93% were dealt within the customer care standard, 12 complaints took longer than the 14 day guideline but customers were contacted and given an explanation of the delay.

7.3 Telephony

In terms of telephony statistics, 88.79% of external calls were answered in 30 seconds which is 3.56% better than the council average and 83.83% of internal calls were answered in 30 seconds which is 1.79% worse than the council average.

7.4 Freedom of Information and Environmental Information Regulation Requests

We received 86 requests for this period of 2011 which has more than doubled for the same period last year which saw 41 requests. 57 of these requests were for Environmental Services and 3 were across all departments.

The highest number of requests was for the Highways Department.

All requests were answered within standard except 2. One was a day late and one was not recognised by the receiver to be a request for information.

8 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

This report has provided information relating to the projected financial and performance outturn as at quarter 3 for the Environmental Services portfolio for the 2011/12 financial year. It is recommended that Scrutiny Committee:

- notes the financial and performance position of the Department as at Quarter Three.
- notes the proposals to repay deficit reserves.
