### 1. Executive Summary

### 1.1 Introduction

This report provides a summary of the performance of the People Services Department during Quarter Two of 2019-20. The report outlines the Department's performance against the priorities of Bolton's Community Strategy – Bolton Vision 2030. The Department has refreshed its performance management framework to refocus its reporting around the three 'life stages' which are central to the delivery of the department's priorities; Start Well, Live Well and Age Well. The following section highlights key performance headlines from the three performance dashboards which are available at section 1.5.

### 1.2 Start Well

The Starting Well dashboard includes performance indicators across early years, children's social care, education learning and child public health services. Key issues highlighted in this quarter's performance include:

- Bolton's Good Level of Development (GLD) has decreased by 0.2% to 67.3% in the most recent data local available, however this is still a better rate than the previous full year (2016/17). This against a backdrop of relatively static rates both nationally (71.5%) and regionally (68.9%). The 15% attainment gap between children receiving Free School Meals and all children in Bolton is in line with the national figure.
- Pupil progress across KS2 in 2019 continues to be positive in all 3 subjects. In the previous two
  years, attainment at the expected standard in combined subjects has been in line with the national
  average and the provisional 2019 results of 62% are currently below the national average.
   Combined 2019 provisional results also indicate that 11% of pupils in KS2 achieve at the greater
  depth standard which is in-line with national and has improved on 2018 figures.
- Nearly all headline measures at KS4 showed an improved attainment position from the previous
  year and a continued positive trend. Two measures that dipped slightly were Maths at Level 5 and
  EBACC Languages at Level 4 but these were both noticeably higher than 2 years previously.
  There is a positive picture when comparing the improving performance in Bolton schools relative to
  other Greater Manchester authorities, however, it remains important to note that all headline
  measures in Bolton are closer aligned with the national picture.
- The Children in Need statistical data for 2018/19 has been published. The latest published rate of referrals to social care in Bolton is 606.6 which is a slight increase from the previous year. The local rate of referrals to social care for this quarter has increased when compared to Quarter 1 and is now above the published rate for 2018/19. Fluctuations in the monthly referral rates have continued which has broadly followed the same pattern as the number of monthly contacts. However, the percentage of re-referrals within 12 months of the previous referral remains stable compared to previous quarterly data.
- The latest published rate of those children subject to a Child Protection Plan is 48, this is a
  significant increase from the previous year. The local data for Quarter 2 represents a significant
  increase and is above the published rate for 2018/19 and above the latest available national
  average, but below comparators. However, the percentage who became the subject of a plan for a
  second or subsequent time has remained stable.
- Quarter 2 has shown a further increase in the rate of Looked After Children (LAC) when compared to previous quarterly data. This rate continues to be above all other comparator averages and above the previous years' performance. Local data for Quarter 2 has seen a decrease from the previous quarter in the number of LAC with 3 or more placements during the year. In comparison, those who have been in 3 or more placements during the year is similar to previous years, with those who have been in 1 placement showing a yearly decrease and those who have been in 2 placements showing a yearly increase.

### 1.3 Live Well

The Living Well dashboard includes performance indicators reflecting services within adult social care, safeguarding adults and population health. Key issues highlighted in this quarter's performance include:

- The combined NEET and Not Known (NK) figure has reduced by 1% since 2018, however this is
  due to enhanced tracking processes resulting in the NK figure reducing. The reduction in NK has
  led to an increase in the NEET figures as we are finding more young people that are NEET. The
  NEET figure has increased, placing Bolton in the 4th quartile. This year authorities in the 4th quartile
  received a ministerial letter asking LA's to ensure they focus priorities on this area.
- Over the last few years the percentage of referrals into Adults Early Intervention Team where full Social Care assessment has been avoided has fluctuated. However, this year has seen an increase from the previous year and the Quarter 2 position represents the highest percentage noted over the last few years at 48%, demonstrating the impact of early intervention and prevention services.
- Efforts to support adults with learning disabilities to enter paid employment continue to show positive results. National data shows an improving performance in Bolton on this, though Bolton remains below national and comparator average.
- The annual rate of younger adults whose support needs were met by admission to residential and nursing care homes has reduced for 2018/19 but remains above comparators. In year data for 2019/20 suggests that we may be on track to admit more younger people this year and continues to be closely monitored via Performance and Finance dashboards.

### 1.4 Age Well

The ageing well dashboard focuses on services for older people, specifically on factors that affect their overall health and services that support their independence. Key issues highlighted in this quarter's performance include:

- The rate of older adults whose support needs were met by admission to residential and nursing care homes has reduced from a 2017/18 peak and is now in line with comparators.
- The delayed transfers attributable to adult social care measure has fallen slightly and is now below the North West average but remains above the England average. Bolton has consistently met the overall DTOC target of 3.3% over the past 2 quarters (based on the bed days methodology), despite the hospital declaring black escalation on at least one or two days most weeks. The area requiring further improvement in relation to social care delays is people awaiting packages of care in their own home; although this could be attributable to health or social care, we are the lowest in Greater Manchester. The Winter Pressures initiative is expected to help with this in terms of additional ringfenced capacity in home support and reablement.
- CQC ratings of Bolton community based social care services continue to show strong performance, with 92.1% rated good or better, down slightly from 94.7% reported in Quarter 4, but still well above the target of 85%. The proportion of Bolton care homes rated Good or better remains just below 80% but has improved slightly.
- The percentage of CQC registered care homes rated good or better has seen a gradual decrease over the last few years. 83% of Bolton CQC registered homes are judged to be good or outstanding at Quarter 2, this is an increase from the previous quarter. This is due to two registered homes that were previously rated as 'requires improvement' now being rated as 'good', and a new inspection of a registered home being rated as 'good'. The lower rates seen at Quarter 1, published in the regional NWADASS report, are based on beds rather than settings, and be attributed to declining ratings within three large homes in the borough. There is also a clear link between the stability of management within settings and poor rating against the 'well led' domain; this theme can also be seen across Greater Manchester.







### 3. External judgements of Bolton services and provision


### 3.1 Ofsted Judgements on Bolton Settings for Children



Bolton is ranked 79th in the country at the end of Quarter 2 with 88.7% of primary schools judged to be good or outstanding. On this measure Bolton remains above the England average of 87.5%. On the measure for the proportion of pupils attending a good or outstanding school, Bolton is ranked 67th in the country and remains above the England average. 90.1% of Bolton primary pupils attend a good or outstanding school compared to 87.5% nationally. Bolton's secondary schools now rank 107th in the country with 68.4% of secondary schools judged to be good or outstanding, with 69.7% of secondary pupils in Bolton attending a good or outstanding school.

Ofsted's new inspection framework for schools came into operation as scheduled in September 2019. Two Bolton Schools have been inspected under the new framework. One saw its grade increase and one saw its grade decline. Ofsted have confirmed that the "Parent View" survey used to gather aren't feedback as part of the school inspection process will change. In particular, Ofsted have added a question to the survey which asks for feedback on how effectively the school is meeting the needs of children with SEND.

### 3.2 CQC inspections of care providers in Bolton



At the end of Quarter 2, 94.7% of Bolton registered community-based adult social care services were judged to be good or outstanding, maintaining strong performance. The improvement from the previous quarter is due to a new inspection of a registered community-based service being rated as 'good', with one service that was previously rated as 'requires improvement' being archived.

83% of Bolton CQC registered homes are judged to be good or outstanding, this is an increase on previous performance on this measure. This is due to two registered homes that were previously rated as 'requires improvement' now being rated as 'good', and a new inspection of a registered home being rated as 'good'.

CQC data enables the translation of the ratings of homes into number of beds (places) for people supported in care homes across the Borough. 60.4% of registered beds are in homes judged to be good or outstanding, which is the same as the previous months. Currently Bolton is the third lowest in performance compared to other North West authorities.

There are four nursing homes currently rated as 'requires improvement', which are classed as large as they have a total of 430 beds between them, explaining the lower ratings of registered beds.

Further detail on judgements of care provision in Bolton is available at **Appendix A**.

### 3.3 Local Authority / Local Area Inspections

Ofsted's programme of inspections of Local Authority Children's Services (ILACS) has continued, 73 reports have been published since the start of the new framework with 39 of those being graded as "Outstanding" or "Good" overall. Focussed visits have continued across various themes, with the majority being against the themes of; Children in Need/Children on Child Protection Plans and the Front Door.

Ofsted's SEND inspections and re-visits have continued throughout the quarter. To date 100 authorities have been inspected against the SEND framework, with revisits being carried out for those that were issued with Written Statement of Actions.

At the time of writing no JTAI inspections against the new 'deep dive' theme on children living with mental ill health have been published.

Over the past 12 months, HMIP have carried out 26 inspections of Youth Offending Teams across England and Wales against the new set of quality standards which were introduced in 2018. From these published inspections, 15 have been graded as "Outstanding" or "Good" overall.




